WHO IS HE? A South Londoner who is challenging notions of the singer-songwriter as a miserable chap strumming in the corner while his fans cry into their beer. Vibrant and colourful, he dances uncontrollably on stage and elicits a similar response from the floor.

WHY THE FUSS? Peñate is becoming an irresistible force. His new single, Torn On The Platform, is set to storm into the Top Ten this weekend, while Mark Ronson caught his London show this week.

SO WHAT DOES HE SOUND LIKE?

His influences, according to MySpace, include Bob Dylan, James Brown, Sam Cooke and Jackson Browne (twice!). In reality, his energetic tunes combine classic skiffle and pop while harking back to the Eighties jangle of The Smiths.

WHAT'S HIS BACKGROUND?
Peñate is grandson of writer Mervyn
Peake. He began playing guitar at 11
and formed his first band with Felix
White, now of The Maccabees, while
at school. After studying classics at
London, he began gigging,
supporting Lily Allen.

AND THEN? Spotted by the XL label, he released his first single, Second, Minute Or Hour, last year. Limited to 1,000 copies, it now changes hands for £50 on eBay. A second single, Spit At Stars, came out in April.

SO WHAT'S NEXT? Peñate plays Brighton's Concorde tonight, Bristol's Thekla tomorrow and Portsmouth's Wedgewood Rooms on Sunday. He also makes festival appearances at Leeds, Reading and the Isle Of Wight. Details: www.jackpenate.com. His debut album follows in September.

'I remember the day she died so clearly. I'd come downstairs to answer the phone and my grandma told me to switch the TV on. I just remember the disbelief and thinking the response to her death was similar to that when Marilyn Monroe died.'


ATASHA had never met Diana and at 25 is too young even to remember her wedding to Prince Charles, but admits she is rather excited about the event.

'The Princes invited every person to perform on the show and I'd like to think they handpicked me — I'm about the same age as William.

"The moment that really got to me at Diana's funeral was seeing the card they had written which just said: "Mummy."

I related to it from the perspective of thinking of how I'd feel if I lost my mum and that started me crying. The Royal Family is meant to be the ideal family, too, and you just don't expect bad things to happen to good people.'

In anyone else, such naivety could be irritating, but while Britney Spears can have a private meltdown and Amy Winehouse exposes her emotional vulnerabilities for all to see, Natasha—a committed Christian—is self-contained and profes-
